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

Campaign to Enhance Ministry in Southeastern Iowa

Synod Launches \$1.2 million campaign for ministry.

We are moving Forward Together as the Southeastern Iowa Synod to bolster our proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ by increasing our capacity to partner with local congregations, regional ministries, new leaders, and new communities.

The 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly approved a \$198-million-dollar campaign in support of new and expanded churchwide ministries. The Campaign for the ELCA, Always Being Made New, focuses on four ministry priorities to ensure the financial and ministerial health and expansion of churchwide services and programs.

The 2015 Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly adopted a series of resolutions in support of the The Campaign for the ELCA while establishing a companion, \$1.2-million-dollar campaign to support ministries of the Southeastern Iowa Synod. Forward Together, the Campaign for the Southeastern Iowa Synod, reflects a commitment to the same priorities: congregations, leadership, hunger and poverty, and the global church.

This effort, concluding in 2019, builds on the rich legacy of this synod while moving forward together.

Our Shared Mission

Stories from Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) a ministry partner of the Southeastern Iowa Synod.

Lutheran Services in Iowa serves Iowa's most vulnerable people, fulfilling a promise to respond to the love of Jesus Christ through compassionate service. They partner with children, youth and families, people with disabilities, the elderly and people of refugee status – helping people in times of need, strengthening families and advocating dignity and social justice for our neighbors in the community.

Every day, thousands of moments of compassionate service are shared at LSI across the state in this article there are two snapshots of service in a day of the life of LSI

No One Loves Me

“Adam” was having a tough night. The young boy, who was staying at LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames, missed his foster family. He felt lonely and afraid. Jeremy, an LSI youth specialist, went to check on Adam and found him crying.

“He was saying, ‘No one loves me,’” said Jeremy. “I told him, ‘That’s not true. The staff here cares about you. I care about you. You are a great kid. And things will get better.’”

Children and youth at LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames and Bremwood Residential Treatment Center in Waverly come from all over the state. All of them have experienced some measure of trauma, neglect or significant challenge in their lives, and LSI provides 24-7 mental health services to help them heal and move forward with their lives. Sometimes service also means reminding children of their own worth with a well-timed word of love.

“We see a lot of kids who have been conditioned by life or by others to believe they aren't cared about and they shouldn't care about anything except themselves,” said Jeremy. “Sometimes the best moments are when we can tease out of a child what he cares about. Like compassion for animals. Or elderly people. Or his friends.”



Helping children see their potential for greatness is one of the reasons Jeremy chose a career in service at LSI.

“I love working with our kids because they have

so much potential,” said Jeremy. “They can learn to recognize who they really are: a kid who deserves to be loved and deserves to love. They can realize they have the capacity to care. They have suffered trauma, and they’ve been conditioned to believe no one cares about them. That’s not true. I do. We do.”

The Greatest Class I’ve Ever Taken

Vachon, age 16, rested on the couch at Retrieving Freedom in Waverly, a black Labrador named Gabriel cuddled comfortably on his chest.

The two were taking a break from a morning training session, one of many to prepare Gabriel for his future life as an ADA-certified service dog.

What Gabriel didn’t know is he was preparing Vachon for life, too. Vachon was one of six teens at LSI’s Bremwood Residential Treatment Center in Waverly to participate in a first-of-its-kind pilot program during the summer of 2015. A partnership between LSI, Retrieving Freedom and the Wartburg College Social Work Department, the program empowers teens at Bremwood to train service dogs for veterans and children with autism.



“It’s wonderful for our teens,” said Susan, LSI clinical supervisor and professor emeritus at Wartburg College. “They are so focused knowing the dogs they help train will go to help a veteran or a child with autism.” And that’s important. Because focus isn’t always easy for these teens.

Bremwood provides 24-7 mental health services for youth ages 13 to 18. Many, though not all, have experienced trauma from abuse, neglect or an unstable home environment. Some have been involved in juvenile court, and others have lived in foster homes.

Training the service dogs inspires the teens to pursue excellence and, most importantly, reminds them they are deserving of it. “The teens do an amazing job,” Susan said. “It’s wonderful motivation for them to keep doing well in other areas of their life, too.” It’s also just doggone fun.

“This is the greatest class I’ve ever taken,” said Vachon. “It’s a good chance to help train the dogs and get close to them and best of all have fun while doing it.”

Congregations: We seek to support emerging and renewed faith communities in our synod. Creating and renewing our presence in places where mission needs outpace the local capacity.

Leadership: The ELCA Fund for Leaders is one of the many needed means by which we enhance the possibility of preparing enough candidates for ministry to meet the growing need. Gifts to the ELCA Fund for Leaders may be designated for the Southeastern Iowa Synod Fund For Leaders, providing support for candidates from this synod.

Hunger and Poverty: We are an anti-hunger synod, we believe in not only feeding people but addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty. As the “breadbasket of the world” and home of the World Food Prize, we see ourselves as leaders in the goal of eradicating hunger in Iowa and around the world.

Global Church: With the support of this campaign we will be able to continue and increase our ministry of accompaniment, walking in ministry together with the Pare Diocese and the Lutheran Church in Tanzania.

Where Needed Most: We seek to use resources wisely and grow our capacity for ministry in southeastern Iowa and beyond. We will fund an endowment, reduce our debt, and make capital improvements to ensure long term stability and ministry.
